The Education Forward Arizona Scholarship opens Jan. 15!

Since 2005, Education Forward Arizona has worked with students enrolled in postsecondary education across the state of Arizona to provide support services that empower them to persist and thrive through college and beyond.

The 2022/2023 Education Forward Arizona Scholarship Application process will open on Jan. 15, 2022 with the new cohort of Ed Forward AZ Scholars announced in May.

Scholarship Awards

- Student may be eligible to receive up to \$6,000 per year (\$2,000 \$3,000 per semester) for 4 years
- Intended for students planning to obtain a bachelor's degree within 4 years (Community college for the first 2 years is an option)
- Mentoring and Success Services are included

Eligibility

- Be an active member of, and recommended by, one of our <u>College Access</u>
 <u>Partner Organizations</u>
- Demonstrate high potential and motivation to succeed in college

- Have a 3.0 Weighted Cumulative GPA
- Be a graduate of an Arizona high school and entering a college or a university as a first-time enrollee
- Meet the criteria to receive Federal Student Aid, be Pell Grant eligible and able to demonstrate significant financial need as reported on the FAFSA
- DACA recipients are also eligible
- The deadline to apply is March 4. Learn more.



The Thunderbirds Scholars Program

Founded in 2019, the Thunderbirds Scholars Program seeks to provide internship and exposure programs to Arizona's talented youth.

To qualify for the four-year, full ride scholarship, applicants must meet the following requirements:

- Graduate from an Arizona high school or equivalent
- Have a minimum GPA of 3.5
- Be prepared to provide letters of recommendation -- academic and personal
- Attend or plan to attend Arizona State University, University of Arizona or Northern Arizona University
- Must not combine the scholarship with other funds except need-based federal financial aid
